For science this week we wanted to know what made balls bounce and which balls bounced the highest.

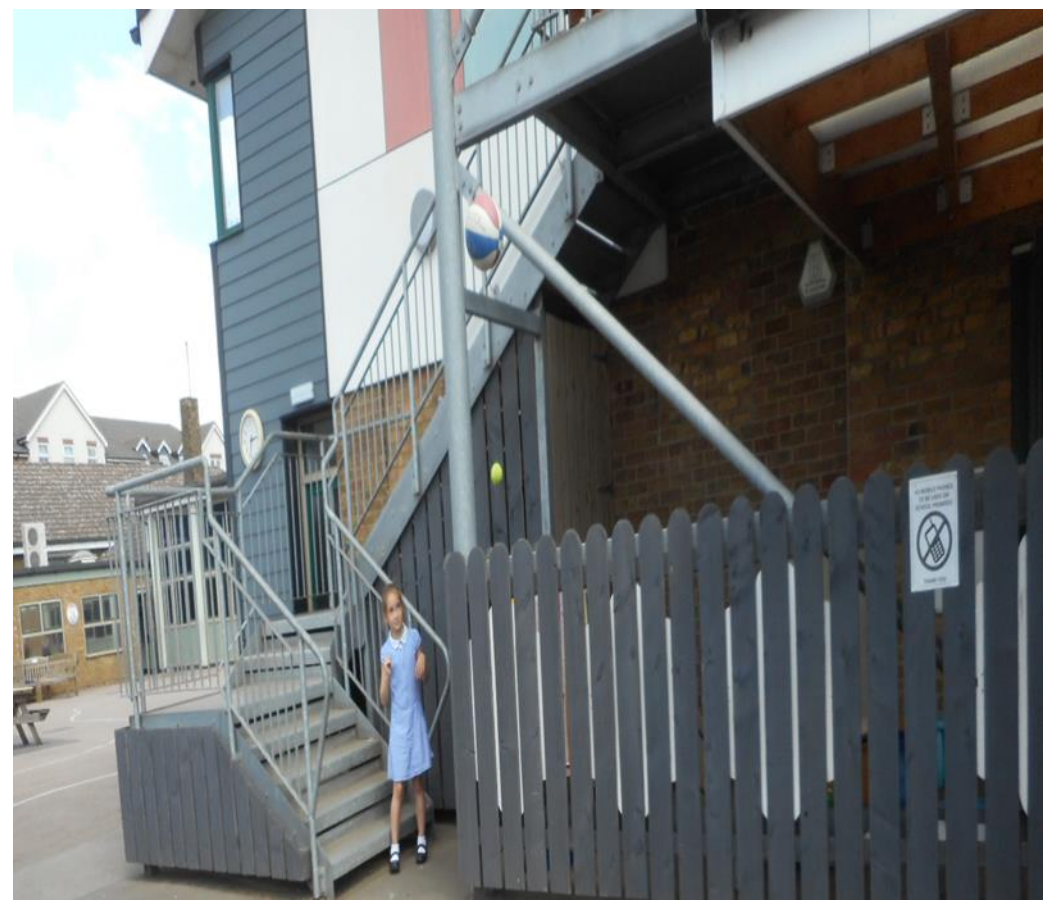


***We learnt that The force of the ball hitting the hard ground puts an equal force back onto the ball, meaning it bounces back up.***
